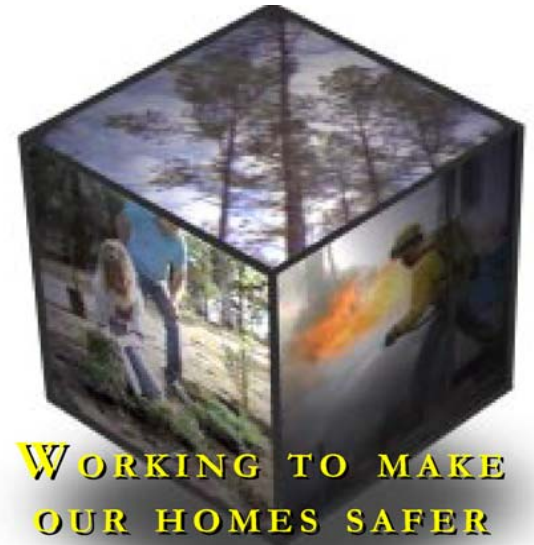

WILDLAND FIRE FACTS!

Since 1970, more than 10,000 homes and 20,000 other structures and facilities have been lost to severe wildland fire, wildfires that have cost our government agencies some \$20 billion to suppress and the insurance industry another \$6 billion in restitution. More than 620 wildland firefighters have been killed on duty since 1910.

COORDINATED NATIONAL PROGRAMS...

America's wildland fire agencies and the NFPA International have been promoting Firewise living since 1986. The National Wildland/Urban Interface Fire Program has attracted new partners in this work and saved about \$20 million annually in fire suppression costs. Now America's Firewise partners are gathering again to create the next generation of Firewise communities.



Through dynamic presentations and such workshop tools as state-of-the-art mapping and wildfire simulations, community leaders and professionals learn first hand the complexities involved in building safer communities, subdivisions, and homes that are prepared for the inevitable effects of unwanted wildland fire.

Participants will learn:

- Firewise land use planning,
- Creative mitigation measures for interface hazards,
- Basic Firewise home construction and landscaping,
- Collaborative decision-making, and
- How to incorporate Firewise planning into existing and developing areas of communities
